I will be soliciting donations via word of mouth, and a letter/email campaign. I am agreeing to the voluntary spending limit and expect to raise around \$5,000 for the campaign. I am my own campaign manager, but will consult with a range of people familiar with Albany from Allen Cain, the Director of the Solano Avenue Association, to Peggy McQuaid, Michael Barnes, and Shaun Charles, the President of the Chamber of Commerce.

I have been a registered Democrat since 1982, and have voted in just about every election (I think I missed a small one while traveling one time). I have donated to many Democratic candidates and measures over the decades, starting with Bill Clinton and Carol Moseley Braun during my time living in Chicago, all the way to Elizabeth Warren and now Joe Biden and Kamala Harris.

Of the work you did in the previous question, pick one item to explain what was your role and how was the Albany community impacted? Limit 100 words. *

On the Parks, Recreation and Open Space Commission, I was part of the subcommittee tasked with evaluating locations for dog parks in Albany. Being aware of the conflict around the Memorial Park offleash dog area, we made extensive outreach to neighbors and park users, we collected the information needed to formulate a plan for the park that addressed concerns of all interested parties. I created initial drafts of the questionaires, designed the doorhangers, and wrote a third of the final report. Albany will soon have a dog park that better meets the needs of users and neighbors because we listened to and respected every perspective.

What in your background - as a person and in your activities professional and otherwise - do you think will help inform your decision making if elected? Limit 100 words. *

I've been working with Albany's business community for 15 years, and been a small business owner for my entire career. Understanding our business community will be important as Albany recovers from the Pandemic. I raised two children in Albany Schools, while being engaged with school and child-related organizations. I'm a lifelong environmentalist and am always looking for solutions to the impinging environmental crises. I am a web developer by profession and have a sound understanding of the promises and pitfalls of technology. Finally, while pursuing my Masters, I read, wrote, and taught about issues like Ethics, Morality, and Justice.

If elected, what would you advocate the city do to support public health during COVID? Limit 100 words. *

We've noticed an increase of people living on our streets. We need to coordinate with the State and County to get folks the support they need to be safe.

The information about the stay at home order is confusing and contradictory. Providing timely, accurate information would be a valuable service.

Some businesses are bending rules about outside dining that leads to greater risk of exposure. We need to better enforce the rules of the stay at home order. The best thing we can do for all our residents is get to Stage 3 as quickly as possible.

If elected, what would you advocate the city do to support businesses during COVID? Limit 100 words. *

The city budget does not include cash that could be granted to businesses that are suffering (the number one request). I have been working with the city on these ideas and more:

Clear Communication: many businesses are confused about what they can or can't do.

Rent negotiation: Some businesses are closing because landlords are unable or unwilling to reduce rent.

A letter from the city could help negotiations. As would a tax on commercial vacancies.

Public restrooms: with few businesses willing to let the public use restrooms, business owners are seeing an increased amount of human waste around their buildings.

If elected, what would you advocate the city do to support businesses in general, after COVID? Limit 100 words. *

I have long argued that the City needs to have an economic development staff position to connect with businesses, and recruit new businesses. The city has paid for reports from outside consultants many times in the past, but they have sat on the shelf without staff to follow up. This was part of the reason I helped create the Economic Development Committee, it's now time to take the next step. We could consider a Business Improvement District (BID) fee that could be used for improvements and staff time. I continue to advocate for electric vehicle charging stations in the city.

If elected, how would you work with stakeholders to address systemic racism and police policy? Limit 100 words. *

The first step for addressing any problem is to admit there is one. Many people don't believe we have the same issues that other cities have, but we do. We need transparency and a clear statement that acknowledges these issues at all levels of the city (not just the Police Department). That is the first step in building trust with stakeholders, but it's a long way from a solution. We then have to bring people together to develop policies, perhaps in a process as open and thorough as the Voices to Vision program the city offered regarding plans for waterfront.

If elected, what would you advocate the City do to address the needs of unhoused individuals and families? Limit 100 words. *

When it comes down to it, the people of Albany (indeed, California and the U.S.) need to be prepared to provide more money to offer the mental health and substance abuse services needed to address the failures of our society to provide for the ill, needy, and vulnerable. We should consider additional funding that could be used to staff a position to address issues related to homelessness, perhaps drawing some of that money from the Police Department budget. Meanwhile, we need policies that do more to encourage building inclusionary housing. We need public restrooms on the greenway near Solano Avenue.

If elected, what would you advocate Albany do about the housing crisis? What would you advocate Albany not do? Limit 100 words. *

Albany will need to build a lot of housing in the coming decades. An important part of that is recruiting and offering incentives to developers to build multi-family buildings in commercial corridors. The San Pablo Avenue Specific Plan is a start. We can't "keep Albany small" without sacrificing inclusion and the environment.

More housing means more students. Maintaining the quality of Albany's schools while inviting more people to live in Albany might mean a new school being built, or existing schools being expanded. It could mean a fee for each new residential development that would go to school infrastructure.

I keep coming back to the fact that I have a history of listening, engaging, and bringing people together. I understand our business community, and I understand our parent community. I am a lifelong environmentalist, and I've actually studied, written, and taught topics like Ethics and Justice. I'm a pragmatist. I've seen a lot of instances of the perfect being the enemy of the good, but we're a small town and must always work together in good faith to come to the best solution we can for Albany. Once we come to that, we have to move forward together.

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
